Amazon Series Adapts More Tales From The Writer Who Inspired "Blade Runner." By Jeff Pfeiffer

If you have loved adaptations of the visionary work of sci-fi author Philip K. Dick that have been made over the years - such as the Blade Runner films (based on the novel Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?) and the Amazon drama The Man in the High Castle (based on the novel of the same name, and which will debut its third season sometime this year) - you'll be

excited to know that Amazon has more Dick adaptations in store.

Several of the author's short stories have each inspired an episode in the new anthology series Philip K. Dick's Electric Dreams. The streaming service says that every one of the 10 standalone episodes is set in a different and unique world - some in the far reaches of the universe, others closer to home

Janelle Monáe in the "Autofac" episode of Electric Dreams

- with time ranges from five to 5,000 years in the future. But at the heart of each episode, as it is at the core of many of Dick's stories, is the exploration of the significance of humanity.

Dick's works are adapted for this series by leading American and British writers and directors, including Ronald D. Moore of Battlestar Galactica and Outlander fame, who also serves as an executive producer for the series.

Another executive producer of Electric Dreams is Bryan Cranston, who will also be part of the large and notable cast of actors bringing Dick's tales to life. Along with Cranston, the series will feature Steve Buscemi, Greg Kinnear, Maura Tierney, Janelle Monáe, Mireille Enos, Anna Paguin, Terrence Howard, Vera Farmiga and many others.

Based on photo captions that we've seen for the series, the Philip K. Dick stories adapted for Electric Dreams in Season 1 will include "The Commuter," "The Father-Thing," "The Impossible Planet," "Real Life," "Crazy Diamond," "Kill All Others," "The Hoodmaker," "Safe & Sound," "Human Is" and "Autofac."

Amazon's foray into a sci-fi anthology series launching at this time may be no coincidence; Netflix's Black Mirror debuts Season 4 on Dec. 29, so it will be interesting to see these similar series competing for the eyeballs of sci-fi fans looking for something to stream.

"In the 19th century, persons suffering from mental illness were thought to be alienated from their own true natures," explains the introductory title sequence to TNT's psychological murder mystery series *The Alienist*. "Experts who studied them were therefore known as alienists."

The Alienist is set in New York City in 1896 at the tail end of America's Gilded Age, when the economic expansion, industrial advances and scientific achievements veiled widespread corruption, organized crime and serious social inequality. In a dark corner of this world, an immigrant boy dressed in women's clothing is found gruesomely murdered. Dr. Laszlo Kreizler (Daniel Brühl), an alienist specializing in child psychology, and New York Times illustrator John Moore (Luke Evans) are drawn into the case, uncovering evidence and following leads that the corrupt police officials won't.

Kreizler and Moore enlist the help of Sara Howard (Dakota Fanning), secretary to then-police commissioner and future president Theodore Roosevelt (Brian Geraghty), to secretly circumvent the police. Sara's the first woman employed by the department, and many of her cohorts are openly hostile.

"Sara just wants to be able to do her job," Fanning says.

"She wants to be able to help other people and be able to use her skills and her intelligence to be of service. She's not really thinking about being a pioneer."

What Sara is thinking about becomes a part of the mystery. As the investigation progresses, more is revealed about her own dark past. "She comes from a family of means, but she's largely been on her own for most of her life and was orphaned at a young age," Fanning says.

Sara's somewhat cold and detached exterior belies her complex emotional core. "A big part of her character is that she doesn't really let other people see her sweat," Fanning says. "She can't show vulnerability because that in this time would have been perceived as weakness. But there are a lot of times when we see her embrace her femininity. It's important to show female characters who are feminine and strong, because of course you can be both."

The Alienist will draw comparisons to a 19th-century True Detective (Cary Fukunaga executive produced both series). Based on early episodes, The Alienist looks like a deep dive into a complex world inhabited by characters who confront a disturbed psychopath and their own natures.

Identity And Fate Give Emotion To This Espionage Thriller. By Barb Oates

What if someone was living your life in a parallel world? And maybe his or her life path turned out better than yours? Starz's new psychological thriller Counterpart ponders that thought on a darker level.

Oscar winner J.K. Simmons (Whiplash) is at the center of this intriguing 10-episode whirlwind. Simmons plays Howard Silk, a cog in a Berlin-based spy agency, whose life is abruptly altered when the firm he's been employed at for 29 years encounters a security breach. The breach involves Howard and his "counterpart" - a nearidentical version of himself who lives in a mysterious parallel world. Each of the men's lives is equally captivating to explore, with Simmons (and a few other cast members) brilliantly playing double duty.

The kindhearted Howard learns that 30 years ago an experiment went awry, which opened a passage to an identical world. While he shares the same DNA and same early memories of his counterpart, when the world split, so did the sequences in each of their lives. Now one side has infighting in their leadership and a faction trying to take over as defectors travel to the other side and assassins chase their marks. As their worlds are about to collide, these two men are joined together with their true motives not fully known.

The series is a bit Inception-like (the 2010 Leonardo DiCaprio blockbuster) in its corporate espionage/alternate universe theme and has just as much emotion, as you'll find yourself rooting for both men.

Steven Soderbergh's Innovative App Becomes An HBO Mini. By Lori Acken

he first thing you should know about Steven Soderbergh's atmospheric five-night HBO miniseries Mosaic is that there's an app for that. And if you haven't already done so, downloading the fun freebie to experience the Emmy- and Oscar-winning director's latest take on storytelling, with scriptwriter Ed Solomon, is an addictive time suck before you get the definitive version of their tale via the series.

The core plot of both app and series is the same: The mysterious murder of cougarish writer/philanthropist Olivia Lake (Sharon Stone, deliciously in her element) unveils a small Utah town's ugly secrets. But the app allows users to choose their path to the tale's resolution via characters who fascinate them most, digging deeper into plot details via quick breakouts called "discoveries" and retracing paths not taken however they please. You don't need the app to enjoy the moody mini, but the knowledge accrued in taking the plunge does enrich the story. And only one reveals with certainty who dunnit and why. Was it the boozy handyman (Garrett Hedlund)? The con man younger lover (Frederick Weller)? Or someone else entirely?

Soderbergh says the sophisticated character study details "what happens when your narrative that you've built for yourself is destroyed by someone else in a brutal way. Where does all that energy go? How is it dispersed? How do you reconstruct a narrative of yourself that allows you to go forward? ... I view it as

a subtle empathy tool."

Thinking app first, Solomon and Soderbergh crafted a basic premise and timeline, winnowed core characters, then papered dry-erase boards with Post-its to

create fully formed narratives for each, figuring out where stories naturally intersected to craft a whole-cloth tale. The mini, which helped fund the app, is minus its intriguing myriad viewpoints but nicely beefs up some characters and plot threads. "I had to make a decision when we got to the linear series: 'Whose scene is this? Whose POV am I in here really?" Soderbergh says, adding that he gave no actor a full version of the twisty script, leaving most guessing if they were good guy or bad to the bitter end. "I explained to everybody that this was a study in subjectivity and that they should embrace that - that they were all, in essence, the leads," he says.

Calling Stone's Olivia "the sun that everybody's got to orbit around," Soderbergh knew he needed a special sort of woman to fill her mountain-chic shoes. "I'd never met Sharon," he recalls of his pitch. "I said, 'Look, Olivia's someone who is very polarizing, says what she thinks and doesn't look back. She's very aware of the power that she has when she walks into a room and doesn't hesitate to use it.' She started laughing and said, 'What a shock that you would think of me!'"

Jane Seymour Flexes Her Comedy Muscles In Pop's New Sitcom. By Kellie Freeze

When Col. Tom Force, the "Godfather of Aerobics," dies unexpectedly, he wills his gym and his fortune to his middleaged slacker son Joe (Matt Jones, who stole scenes on Mom and Breaking Bad), but only if he can successfully uphold the family's honor by winning a national aerobics competition. Standing in Joe's way are his archrival (Chris Diamantopoulos) and his former flame (AnnaLynne McCord), who want the Force fortune for their own.

Jane Seymour also stars in the bitingly funny comedy as Joe's sassy mom, Janet. She's a former pageant queen whose body is as great an asset as her mind, and Seymour loves showing off her funny side as a hilarious and sexy master manipulator. "I think I'm a natural comedian but somehow segued into playing straight roles and romantic roles," the actress says. "As the series goes on, they really made me even funnier and funnier. They've got me doing outrageous things!"

Let's Get Physical is a farcical homage to the 1980s aerobics craze, and Seymour shares a surprising connection, laughing, "Oh my God, I'm on the cover of the Jane Fonda pregnancy workout! I mean, how close do you need to get?"

Seymour relishes her character's antics and is thrilled that the series takes full advantage of Jones' gift for physical comedy. "He's a phenomenal talent," she says. "This is his moment." Seymour reveals that the pair worked together on her 2011 Hallmark film Perfectly Prudence, "so I already feel a sort of maternal feeling towards him." She laughs. "I knew exactly how to annoy him."

Cocaine **GODMOTHER**

Catherine Zeta-Jones Stuns As The Horrific Colombian Drug Trafficker Griselda Blanco.

Fans of films like The Godfather and Goodfellas will relish the story of Griselda Blanco - the famed Colombian drug lord who rose to the top of the Medellin Cartel in the late 1970s and early '80s - who is now the centerpiece of the Lifetime biopic Cocaine Godmother: The Griselda Blanco Story. Griselda's




nefarious story, brought to life by Catherine Zeta-Jones' intoxicating performance, could have easily warranted a theatrical outing; instead, delightedly it makes its bow on TV this month.

Editorial narratives, as told through the DEA agent tracking Griselda, weave through the film and share the story of a young girl abused by her mother who makes her way to the U.S. at an early age to become one of the most ruthless drug traffickers in history.

Shortly after arriving in New York in the early '70s, Griselda (a.k.a. La Madrina) made a living as a petty criminal providing counterfeit passports to local drug dealers. Married three times and a mother to four boys (three of whom would later become involved in her criminal empire), Griselda had the creativity and street smarts to become a pioneer in the criminal world. She's credited with being the mastermind behind drive-by motorcycle assassins and using beautiful women and the elderly as mules to smuggle drugs, as well as allegedly ordering the deaths of over 200 people (including children).

In the end she was regaled as the Black Widow/Cocaine Godmother but "everything she touched turned to @#\$%." She was eventually deported and in 2012 was assassinated with a technique she's credited with introducing.

New Saga Explores Designer's Famous Life And Infamous Death. By Kellie Freeze

The second chapter of executive producer Ryan Murphy's American Crime Story saga begins on Jan. 17 with the premiere of The Assassination of Gianni Versace: American Crime Story. "I think the word 'assassination' has a political overtone," says Murphy, "and I think it denotes somebody who is taking the life of somebody else to make a point. And I think that's exactly what Andrew Cunanan did and what he was trying to do, and that's explored in the show."

Season 2 of the anthology series will explore Cunanan's 1997 cross-country killing spree, which left five people dead, including fashion mogul Gianni Versace. The all-star cast includes Edgar Ramírez as Versace, Penélope Cruz as his sister Donatella, Ricky Martin as Versace's partner Antonio D'Amico and Darren Criss as Cunanan.

Ramírez is best known for his role in *Joy* and his Golden Globe-nominated turn as the titular character in the miniseries *Carlos*. For Murphy, he was the only man who could play Versace. "I've seen a lot of his work, and I think his work is incredibly soulful," says Murphy. "You cannot deny the physical appearance and the resemblance, which is startling."

The Venezuelan actor reveals that to play Versace, who was a decade his senior, he gained "10 kilos – 20 pounds" and found a new fondness for prosthetics. "It took me a while," he laughs. "But now, I put on my wig, and I'm ready."

Ramírez shares that he was drawn to the role because

of Versace's bold and iconic status as a cultural disrupter. "Basically, the world that we live in is a world aesthetically that Gianni Versace created," he explains. "For the first time, he combined sexiness and glamour and opulence like no one has ever done before."

The series is based on Maureen Orth's controversial book *Vulgar Favors: Andrew Cunanan, Gianni Versace, and the Largest Failed Manhunt in U.S. History.* "The first episode obviously deals with the literal murder – assassination – itself," explains Murphy. "And then we tell the story in reverse." When a scene of the series was screened to members of the Television Critics Association, we witnessed a taste of Versace's beautiful life and ugly, violent death. It culminates with Cunanan slaying the designer on the front steps of his opulent Miami Beach home. Murphy recalls, "The assassination was important and tough to shoot, and the crew was crying, and we were very emotional doing it."

And while the home is no longer owned by the Versace family, Criss shares, "I had a moment when I walked in the building where I really could feel Gianni's presence. ... I found myself walking in there and sorta talking to Gianni and being like, 'Look, man, this is a really horrible thing that happened here, and I'm so appreciative of what you've given the world."

Taylor Kitsch Has Us Under David Koresh's Spell. By Ryan A. Berenz

"If you don't make enough noise, the world might forget about you," says David Koresh (Taylor Kitsch) in Waco. The noise Koresh made nearly 25 years ago still echoes through history.

In the spring of 1993, Koresh and followers of his Branch Davidian religious sect were hunkered down in their compound outside of Waco, Texas. Federal agents, acting on warrants issued for weapons violations, raided the compound. A gun battle ensued, resulting in the deaths of four agents and six Branch Davidians. The FBI held a 51-day siege on the compound before unleashing an assault that ended in the deaths of 76 Branch Davidians - men, women, children and Koresh himself.

Paramount Network (formerly Spike) launches its first original series with the six-part event Waco, chronicling what life was like inside Koresh's polygamist commune, as well as how federal agents - often motivated by politics and publicity - assembled the case against Koresh.


To portray Koresh, Kitsch pored over hundreds of hours of videos, recruiting tapes and recorded phone conversations, and had a close relationship with Waco survivor David Thibodeau.

"I think he was mad brilliant, and that would be very hard to debate that he wasn't," Kitsch says of Koresh, whom he calls "Dave" throughout our interview. Koresh had memorized the Bible, and he employed it to his advantage. "Any time they had Dave in a corner or his back against the wall, he would resort to something that no one could one-up him in, and that's going to Scripture," Kitsch says.

Koresh was incredibly persuasive, gaining many well-educated followers. "He would be an incredible coach," Kitsch says. "And the best coaches were the ones that knew how to coach individually, on what makes each individual tick, and also make them feel like they're serving a purpose. And I think Dave was just a master at that. And it does go into fear, and it does go into the unknown, and it goes into their weaknesses."

Kitsch hopes Waco will give viewers a different perspective on the events than the one-sided story the media presented in the '90s. "It's just a matter of trying to find the whys," Kitsch says. "Even after this, there's going to be a lot of unanswered questions. But I hope we provoke it, and I hope we enlighten a lot of people, and I hope these questions are asked."

Adults Pose As Students To Expose What It's Like To Be A Teen. By Barb Oates

The team that brought us the prison-life docuseries 60 Days In (Lucky 8 TV) turns its cameras on the challenges of high-school students in A&E's new social experiment Undercover High. Seven young adults ranging in age from 21 to 26 go undercover as high-school students for one semester in this 11-episode docuseries.

"While the shows have that similar DNA, they're very different," executive producer Gregory Henry stresses. "It's not like, 'Can you survive high school?' That's not the intent here. It really is, how do you pierce that teen veil, that teen bubble, because it's become so difficult for adults to really see the world through the eyes of those kids."

Stripped of their true identities, the undercover adults turn in their credit cards and cellphones and are given a new phone with fake social media accounts, along with some coaching, before being immersed into Highland Park High School in Topeka, Kan. Only the school administrators and select members of the community know their true identities and the reason for their semester-long stay.

"You're signing up to go live in a place for five months, and you're going to go to school, and you're going to take tests, and you're going to go to class. They get that this is much more than a television show," Henry explains.

Each of the participants had their reasons for becoming involved. Most were looking to broaden and strengthen their occupational skill sets and help impact positive change. Erin, age 25, decided to get braces to look more the part. She didn't, however, expect how difficult it would be to keep up with social media, relearn algebra and follow lunchroom conversations. Also unexpected for 22-year-old Lina was the segregation among blacks and Hispanics and the speed at which social media was used to befriend and to bully.

The series is a fascinating and sometimes brutal awakening to the challenges teens and school staff members endure daily.

"Annie is very strong, she is very flawed, and she has, consequently, had a very reckless life," says Paquin. "But it has also made her a very, very good cop." Annie's ability to solve the puzzles is paramount to solving the cases and also figuring out how they connect - to each other and to her.

Bellevue is a bleak drama with twists at every turn. The series concludes neatly at the end of its octet of episodes, making it a quick wintertime chiller that will satisfy even the most time-pressed of amateur sleuths.

Executive produced and hosted by Curry, each episode of We'll Meet Again attempts to reunite people who were thrown together - or torn apart - during pivotal moments in history.


"This series helps people separated by conflict, war and humanitarian disasters find each other again and reveals untold stories of courage, survival, friendship and even love," says Curry. "This is human history - not from the point of view of kings or politicians or generals - but of everyday people on the front lines of massive events they have no way to control. Their stories tell us something about what we are made of."

Among the deeply personal tales told are that of a Vietnam War baby desperate to find the American father she last saw 40 years ago, a military chaplain who helped a stranger through the trauma of 9/11, a Japanese-American girl interned in 1942 who never forgot a compassionate classmate, and civil rights workers whose lives were forever changed by the deep relationships they formed in the 1960s South.

"I think that these kinds of stories are sorely needed now," Curry says. "Knowing about the potential of compassion, knowing about the value of courage and how we find it - in part because others allow it to happen in us - these kinds of stories are really important right now."

PBS Retraces The Brazilian Expedition That Nearly Killed Teddy Roosevelt. By Meredith Ennis

Into the Amazon, which tells the story of the 1914 journey into the heart of the Brazilian rainforest taken by former President Theodore Roosevelt and legendary Brazilian explorer Cândido Rondon, opens the 30th season of American Experience this month. Alec Baldwin provides Roosevelt's voice, and Narcos star Wagner Moura voices Rondon.

Roosevelt's excursion was supposed to be a tranguil journey to chart an unexplored tributary of the Amazon River, Before it was over, one member of the expedition had drowned, another had been murdered, and the murderer was abandoned to perish in the jungle. Roosevelt himself would be badly injured and beg to be left to die.

In the end, he survived to tell the tale of his greatest adventure. After paddling more than 400 miles, the expedition reached the mouth of the River of Doubt, now known as the Rio Roosevelt.

Director John Maggio says, "I was drawn to the material because I do feel that there is a sense that there aren't many frontiers left, and I think Theodore Roosevelt was drawn to that, and I was drawn to the idea: How deep can we go? How far can we go, to a physical sense of the frontier? And what Cândido Rondon was doing was a sense of Manifest Destiny for [his] country. It really was about connecting the city, the Rio and other cities with the Amazon, and incorporating people there in a very different way than we did it in this country. He believed - maybe naively a little bit - [that] you can incorporate slowly the Western traditions to the Indians as he moved forward through the rainforest. It was certainly a more passivist approach than the approach that we had in this country."

f you had trouble knowing who to root for as Divorce Season 1 came to a close, you weren't alone. Frances (Sarah Jessica Parker) cruelly kiboshed estranged husband Robert's fledgling business. Robert (Thomas Haden Church) dispatched Frances' erstwhile lover Julian to her gallery opening and falsely reported her to the cops for "kidnapping" their kids.

So where are the feuding exes as Season 2 dawns? Blessedly over it. And getting on with it.

"Everybody made a committee decision that we're just gonna get those documents signed and stamped in the first five minutes and be done with it and move on and see how their lives develop," says Church of the show's retooled sensibility under new showrunner Jenny Bicks, a longtime writer/executive producer on Parker's fame-making Sex and the City. "We set out to make it a little bit sunnier in Westchester County. We didn't want as much conflict." Instead, Season 2 which time-jumps six months forward - is infused with a wistful hopefulness as the

DuFresnes disengage without losing sight of each other. "We definitely tried to build a much more fulfilling dynamic with them, and with the kids, this season," Church offers. "[The kids] are way more involved."

Making peace with some giant steps backward in his career, Robert finds an unexpected job perk in beautiful, ballsy real estate broker Jackie (Ugly Betty's Becki Newton), leaving Frances wobbly that her ex is no longer pining. The relationship also has ramifications for Frances' friendship with therapist Dallas (Talia Balsam) and a caught-in-the-middle Diane (Molly Shannon) and Nick (Tracy Letts), who are trying to mend their own fractious union by literally saying something nice or saying nothing at all. "We gave those relationships more room to breathe, too," Church explains. "Tracy, Molly and Talia, they're such compelling performers, and it was never intended to just be 'The Robert and Frances Show.'"

If you're leery of Robert's May-December romance, rest assured that Bicks and company soundly grounded the relationship in Robert's clear-eyed

new mindset - at Church's behest. "I thought that Becki was terrific, but I was concerned," Church admits. "Do we really want to do that, that Robert ends up with somebody that's so much younger?' I wanted it to be more longlead, that he wasn't just looking to just jump into bed with somebody. The feeling-out process between Jackie and Robert goes on for a while."

Frances, meantime, finds passion of a different sort when she happens upon the paintings of a local artist whose past gallery experiences have soured her on showing her work. And her own love life gets a boost when Nick and Diane introduce her to their pal Andrew (Steven Pasquale). Amy Sedaris also signs on as Robert's dingbat sister in an episode that sees Frances race to her ex's side in a crisis with results both tender and hilarious. "I love making SJ laugh, and she can absolutely just knock me down with funny," Church says of his longtime friend. "I'd put her work ethic up against Elon Musk's any day. Sarah Jessica Parker could be president of the United States. George Clooney's gonna run in 2020, so why not SJ?"

Series Creator Chris Carter Unlocks The Mysteries Of Season 11. By Kellie Freeze

OX's supernatural series returns this month and continues the saga of FBI Special Agents Dana Scully (Gillian Anderson) and Fox Mulder (David Duchovny) as they search for truth within unexplainable events. We chatted with series creator Chris Carter, and he outlined where the season starts and offered a taste of this season's adventure.

It took a lot of courage to write Season 10 as a cliffhanger without knowing if there'd be a Season 11. How were you so sure that The X-Files would be back?

Chris Carter: I wasn't sure. I always write as if it is the end, and I thought that would be an interesting ending. It certainly left people wanting and wondering, but I always write as if the show is never coming back. Luckily, the show is coming back, and I designed it also in a way that I knew where we would be going.

In the final scene of Season 10, Scully stood on a bridge as an extraterrestrial light shone down from above. Where does Season 11 pick up?

I can tell you that you will find that that light in Scully's eye isn't necessarily from a spaceship. She has had a medical condition - a seizure - and you will find that the things that she witnessed and experienced were part of a connection to her son, who she's been estranged from for 17 years.

Scully's son, William, has been oft-mentioned but little seen on the series. Now, Scully believes that he may be key to curing a global pandemic. Is that a lot of responsibility for a character viewers haven't met?

We are going to meet him. ... It's not putting a responsibility on him. We'll find out that it is actually his destiny.

How did you approach Season 11 differently than Season 10?

I felt that Season 10 was a standing start. We had to come

back, and we had to reorient the audience. The hardcore audience needed less reorienting, but the casual or new audience needed orienting. I find that is not necessarily as true coming back now; we're at a running start rather than a standing start, which is a nice thing.

Which episodes stand out as ones that will particularly thrill fans of The X-Files?

I know that Episode 7, which is a big departure for us, is going to be an interesting episode. I loved the script, and we got a capable director, Glen Morgan, who I think is going to bring it all to reality in an interesting way.

Which episodes uphold The X-Files' tradition of using levity in unexpected ways?

Episodes 2, 3 and 4 take advantage of the actors' tremendous comedic talents, but in different ways. Episode 4 is a Darin Morgan episode, so you get what I would call an "X-Files parody," but a very idiosyncratic and brilliant one and timely one. Episode 2 - Glen Morgan's episode coming off what I would call "the thriller" Episode 1 – has some comedy, even though it's a really action-packed episode. I wrote Episode 3, which has a darkly comedic element.

Do you foresee an end to The X-Files?

I open the paper every day, and I see another X-Files episode, so I think it is an evergreen in that sense. And that, because this show is science-based, there's always interesting new science on which to draw science fiction from. So I think that you could tell X-Files stories into the future. I'm not sure if the show will outlive all of us in terms of current production, but there are stories to tell. It's really a question of if David and Gillian want to come back and keep doing them, because I think without Mulder and Scully it wouldn't be The X-Files.

On a Monday afternoon in November, the cast of NBC's *The Blacklist* gathered on the show's New York City set, which sits along the Hudson River, to celebrate its 100th episode. James Spader was all smiles as he shared some hugs amid the rest of the cast and media taking part in cake and photo ops. Between the festivities, we did get



down to business to talk about the banner episode and the rest of the season.

What's in store for the 100th episode airing Jan. 17 ...

John Eisendrath, executive producer: It's special because we have Nathan Lane, and that is super special. He is the "blacklister" of the episode. ... A lot of people said to us, "It's your 100th episode. You should do things that

are like a wink and a nod." We rarely do that, unless it feels organic. Although in the 100th episode, Liz is doing a story that is a total shoutout that harkens back to one of our favorite blacklisters. And what she does in the episode is exactly what the blacklister did in the episode that he was in and tried to do to her.

Jon Bokenkamp, creator and executive producer: There's also a story about a hat. It's a fun, big episode. There's a heist element to it.

What's next for Liz (Megan Boone) and Red (James Spader) in the aftermath of Tom's (Ryan Eggold) death ...

Megan Boone: She's dealing with Tom's murder and really kind of changing as a character, using more questionable and illegal tactics to achieve her ends. We're seeing her move slowly toward becoming Red. In a way, we're seeing how Red became Red by lifting that curtain. I think there's a real deep-seated need for revenge. When you're grieving, I know waking up in the morning can be a difficult thing to negotiate for yourself. And in that negotiation, I think she has to throw in some kind of motivator. And the motivator is, the purpose of her life now is to get to the people who destroyed her family and destroy them.

The NBC Series Gets A "More Mills" Reboot. By Lori Acken

hen *Taken* debuted last winter, fans of the Luc Besson film franchise on which the series was based knew they were getting an origin story. What they didn't expect was that the drama and its core character Bryan Mills (Clive Standen) were almost unrecognizable to the Besson mythology.

Rather than give up on a promising premise, NBC instead opted to reboot its reboot, cleaning house on an oft confusing array of supplemental characters and bringing in *Person of Interest's* Greg Plageman to oversee a more Mills-centric tale, augmented with just a pair of intriguing newbies.

In Season 2, Mills is still in the black-site Mexican prison when he, of course, witnesses a kidnapping. Meantime, his former handler Christina Hart (Jennifer Beals), now running her own private security firm, taps a pair of unusual allies to help free him – a former soldier and master negotiator named Santana (Jessica Camacho, *The Flash*) and a wry and dangerous super-hacker who calls himself Kilroy (Adam Goldberg, *The Jim Gaffigan Show*) and hasn't forgotten that Hart once put him away.

Sitting on the Toronto set of the gang's new "hide in plain sight" lair, Plageman says he wanted to add modern relevancy to the action and focus on what made Mills exceptional, not vulnerable. "Let's see that resourcefulness," Plageman explains. "Let's see that guy that can take the mantle of someone else's situation on and make that situation right for them. I didn't feel his exceptionalism [in Season 1], and I wanted to understand what made this guy special ... to show some flashbacks, learn more about what happened to this guy and why was he different."

"The very first 10 minutes of Season 2 is where Bryan becomes a man," says Standen. "It's about new beginnings. ... You want to feel Bryan's in jeopardy every time, that there's some blood, sweat and tears involved. That he keeps getting knocked down, but he keeps getting back up again. It's gone back to the M.O. of the film, which is about one man who is just relentless. ... That's what I'm doing more now, is putting it down and socking it to the man!"

Other frontrunners for NFC playoff berths are the Minnesota Vikings, L.A. Rams, New Orleans Saints, Carolina Panthers, Seattle Seahawks and Falcons.

This year's Super Bowl halftime show headliner, Justin Timberlake, will try to top his own act. Timberlake's last Super Bowl halftime appearance was in February 2004, when he was an accessory to Janet Jackson's infamous "wardrobe malfunction," from which the national psyche has yet to fully recover.






